March (16) 23, 2017 Meeting Minutes

Diamonds in Arkansas

Teen Finds 7.44 Carat Diamond In Crater Of Diamonds, Arkansas. *(This article came out shortly after our March bulletin was printed. I thought it was a great follow up to the Arkansas dig sight.)*

A 14-year-old boy named Kaleb Langford found a 7.44 carat diamond at the Crater of Diamonds State Park, Arkansas. The boy and his father were surprised to know that the diamond they found was the largest brown diamond to be found at the park in 40 years.

The officials also said that this was the seventh largest diamond to be discovered since the establishment of the park in 1972, according to several media reports published Thursday.

Kaleb Langford found the pinto bean-sized brown stone while he was walking along the side of a riverbank in the park on Saturday. He knew it was not an ordinary rock and showed it to his father. Craig Langford, Kaleb Langford's father said they both "knew we needed to have it looked at." Kaleb Langford named his diamond "Superman Diamond" because he is a fan of the superhero and as per the park's policy, he was allowed to take the precious stone home as a souvenir.

Several others have also found diamonds at the park in the past few years. In April 2015, Susie Clark found a white, 3.69 carat teardrop-shaped diamond and named it as "Hallelujah Diamond." In October 2016, Dan Frederick and his daughter Lauren Frederick found a 2.03 carat diamond on their first visit to the park. Vanessa Yurkevich of CNN Money also tried her luck but failed in 2015.

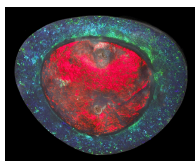
"Uncle Sam," a 40.23 carat diamond was the largest diamond ever to be unearthed on land in the United States in 1924, according to the Associated Press.

Famous Gemstones: Fire Queen Opal

The Fire Queen has an interesting and somewhat sad history. Found roughly around 1906 in the Angledool diggings. It was alive with color and dubbed too beautiful for words. Not only that she weighed in at 6.5 oz. which is nearly 900 carats an expensive Opal in today's market! However unfortunately back then Opals didn't have much of a market so all it could manage to sell for was the tiny sum of £100. The Fire Queen was passed from buyer to buyer with each seller having trouble finding a buyer due to the uneducated market for Opals. It wasn't until 18 years later in 1928 that it ended up in the Chicago museum with a valuation of £40,000 a far reach from the original £100! In the 1940's it was resold to non other than J.D. Rockefeller for £75,000 who then donated The Fire Queen to his family collection.

We received this on our Show web page. I thought I would share it because it really does make the hard work worth it.

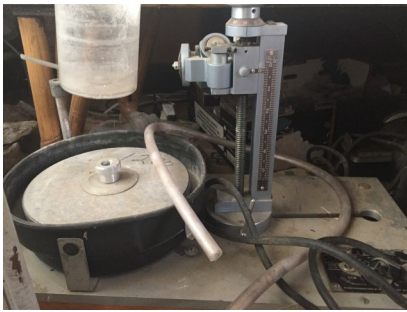
