January 18, 2018 Meeting Minutes

The Magic Valley Gem Club was convened on January 18, 2018 at 8pm. President Jon Cromer welcomed the members and visitors. There were 15 members and 4 visitors in attendance. Minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed. Dick Morris made a motion to approve, seconded by Shirley Metts. The members approved. The Treasurer, Rocky Metts listed bills paid last month: the Postoffice, membership to Federation AAL, Trailer licenses, Grand prize for the March Show, Jon Cromer for expenses, and Trudy Hunt for Hospitality purchases. President Jon Cromer discussed new changes discussed by the Executive Board during their Jan meeting: 1) Change of meeting Place due to conflicts in scheduling. It had been suggested we move our monthly meetings to the American Legion Building. It will cost a monthly fee of \$25. Rebekah Yancey made a motion to that effect and it was seconded by Dick Morris. The membership approved. This building is located at 447 Seastrom, off of Eastland near the Pepsi Plant. A map will be generated to show the location. 2) The format of our meetings was discussed, to make them more productive. It was approved by the Executive Committee to keep our 2 hour meeting times, but to change the scheduling...the membership meeting will begin at 7pm and go for a duration of 30 minutes, followed by the featured activity/program for 45 minutes with refreshments following.

It was strongly suggested that we all refrain from visiting during the meeting and presentations unless invited by the president. 3) Distribute a survey to members for interests and presentations they might provide. 4) Distribute a membership list with phone numbers to members for personal use. (ie. unplanned trips to the hills) 5) The executive Board also approved the 2018 Board Officers list. (the list is in the executive board section) A motion was made by Jim Stanton and seconded by Julie Folks. The membership approved. In executive board it was suggested that the members consider and change from a 1 year term to a 2 year term of office.

The president ask for reports from the following: Trudy Hunt, asking for refreshments for the coming year, there will be a sign-up sheet. She also suggested it be only a treat (cookies) and a drink. She also asked for suggestions for the show day workers meal. Wilma reported having fliers for the upcoming show and sign-ups for the Display Cases. There are 40-41 cases available. Members were reminded that there will be a vote from the "attendies" denoting their favorites make it spectacular....you might get a prize! Rockhounding in the US.....California

California is abundant with geological forces where mineralogists and gemologists can rockhound for the largest variety of rocks and minerals.

Famous Gemstones: Pearl of Lao Tzu

This pearl -- the largest known pearl in the world -- was discovered by a Filipino diver; then acquired by American Wilburn Cobb in the Philippines in the 1930s. It was previously known as the Pearl of Allah, because of its resemblance to a turban. When Cobb died in 1979, Peter Hoffman and Victor Barbish bought the pearl, using some money borrowed from Joseph Bonicelli. Today, the gem is owned equally by heirs of these 3 men, and is not on public display.




The rock and mineral wealth of California has made California the most interesting and one of the oft visited places for rockhounders.

Desert of California Visited by Various Rockhounders

The place is visited by all types of rockhounders like rockhounders hunting for rare and precious minerals which are used for commercial purposes as well as rockhounders who rockhound as a hobby and for hunting beautiful rocks and minerals. In earlier days that are before 1930 the desert of California was visited for rockhounding for commercial interests. However, after 1930 the interest for rockhounding increased among people that resulted in the formation of rockhounding groups and rockhounders began to make group visits to the desert of California even for recreational purposes.


