Monthly safety article



One of the real dangers rock hounders face are rattlesnakes.

Western rattlesnake: Rattlesnakes (the Western and less common prairie) are the only poisonous snakes in Idaho. They're most common in rocky areas, but can swim so they're sometimes found around water.

An understatement: "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure!" when it comes to rattlesnake bites! If someone gets bitten by a rattlesnake, get them to the nearest hospital immediately. Limit the victim's activity if possible to keep their heart rate normal. Help the individual to remain calm and comfortable. Reassure the victim that it is not life-threatening. Wash the bite area with water and remove restrictive jewelry or clothing that would interfere with swelling. Position the affected bite area below the victim's heart. Call 911 to contact the hospital to alert staff to facilitate treatment instructions. Steps to Prevention:

- 1. Wear high leather boots and / or snake-leggings.
- 2. Stay close to vehicles and transportation routes.
- 3. Do not rockhound alone.
- 4. Always assume snakes are active even if the weather is cold and cloudy.
- 5. Snakes are more likely to be out from under cover on cloudy warm days and especially at night.
- 6. Use a walking stick or rock scoop/grabber to explore with or overturn rocks. (Baby snakes have venom!)
- 7. Walk slowly in areas of thicker vegetation, create vibrations with your footsteps and your walking stick.
- 8. Walk away from the shaded side of bushes or holes when it is sunny and hot.
- 9. Walk around logs or large rocks or drop-offs where a rattlesnake may be resting.
- 10. Be especially alert when climbing a steep incline, which could result in a snakebite to the upper body.
- 11. If a rattlesnake is located slowly move away and warn others. Do not try to kill it and collect its rattles!
- 12. Rattlesnakes do not always rattle-look for them.

Leave rattlesnakes alone and they will leave you alone. They play a critical role in nature by limiting the number of rodents. You don't have to kill them.

Idaho mining history:

Stibnite is one of Idaho's youngest ghost towns. Stibnite is also the mineral name for antimony ore. Mining for gold and antimony began at Stibnite in 1931. Later a body of rich tungsten ore was found. During World War 11, Stibnite produced ninety-eight percent of America's antimony and most of it's tungsten. Both metals were vital for making machines and weapons for fighting the war. The rich tungsten ore had run out by the end of the war in 1945. Later a rich antimony mine opened in Central America. The new mine made the price of antimony drop so low, the Stibnite mine could not stay in business. It closed in 1952. Today only the pieces of a few old buildings and machines remain. The huge open-pit mine, once busy with men, machines, and trucks, has become a small mountain lake.

The **Stibnite Mine** is located about 13 miles from Yellow Pine. **Stibnite** was a "company" town of several thousand people, with its own hospital and school. There was also a bowling alley, a theater, a ski team and a high school football team.



Miners first came to Stibnite during Idaho's gold rush days in 1899. Over the next few years, the number of miners at the site continued to grow and several operators, including United Mercury Mining Company and Bradley Mining Company, started working in the area.

In 1938,

miners started focusing their efforts on the Yellow Pine Pit. Miners were able to extract large quantities of gold from this area of the site. However, operations at the pit blocked fish passage and to this day fish in the East Fork of the South Fork of the salmon river cannot swim upstream past the site.



During World War II, antimony became a mineral that was critical to the war effort. It was used to create bullets. Stibnite

contained such large quantities of antimony that individuals were able to serve their country by working at the site. At one point, more than 1,500 people were working at the site. From 1941 to 1945 Stibnite mined and milled more tungsten and antimony than any other mine in the United States. During this wartime period Stibnite produced 40 percent of the nation's domestic supply of tungsten and 90 percent of its antimony.

After World War II, operations at the site slowed down and many miners moved out of the area. Mining continued in the area sporadically from the 1970s to the late 1990s.



Rock of the month: Moonstone



Moonstone is a sodium potassium aluminium silicate, with the chemical formula (Na,K)AlSi3O8. Its name is derived from a visual effect, or sheen, caused by light diffraction within a microstructure consisting of a regular succession of feldspar layers.

The meaning of moonstone is in its energy—a nourishing, sensual, deeply feminine energy that knows how to heal and bring you back to wholeness. It is the stone of the mother moon, deep healing waters, and sacred feminine energies.

Feldspar / moonstone can be found In Idaho Camas creek near Fairfield.

Moonstone is the Florida State Gemstone; it was designated as such in 1970 to



commemorate the Moon landings, which took off from Kennedy Space Center. Despite it being the Florida State Gemstone, it does not naturally occur in the state.


